# Recaptured: 2017 AGM

The Mitcham Historical Society Inc. Annual General Meeting was held on the 26 September 2017 in the Drawing Room at Scotch College. John Wood was elected Chairperson for the year and Julie Hogan was thanked for her decade of undertaking this role and after presenting her report of the year's activities and Brian Angus reporting re our healthy financial situation we were delighted to hear Julie would be undertaking our "Historian" role into 2018. David Cosh (vice chair), Brian Angus (Treasurer), Sandy Matz (Secretary), Trish Cosh, Helen Robinson, Peter Basedow and Julie Hogan formed the committee for 2017 / 2018.

We were fortunate to have an excellent power point presentation by Dr Robert Stone, his topic being 'The Role of Archaeology in History'. Dr Stone discussed how the role of an archaeologist is not solely an excavator of historic sites. His presentation briefly discussed some of the projects undertaken by archaeologists, primarily in Mitcham, but with reference to other sites in South Australia, not all involved excavation but included:

- -Major surveys
- -Research projects
- -Consultancy on changes to heritage listed properties (cultural heritage management)
- -Monitoring renovation of heritage properties
- -Excavation of historic sites
- -Emergency excavation of development sites (archaeologists vs bulldozers)
- -Supervising student archaeology research projects (field work experience)

He finished with a brief discussion on the symbolism of 19th century stately homes in South Australia with special focus on properties in Mitcham. Participants were delighted with the presentation and thanked Dr Stone accordingly. We are fortunate that Dr Robert Stone has joined the Society as a member so we look forward to seeing him attending further events.

## From Strength to Strength

Our environment and heritage projects are going from strength to strength, thanks to the close working relationship between community groups, schools, government authorities, and our committed political representatives at all three levels of government and the local community. 2018 will be another exciting and productive year!

BCA is appreciative of the bipartisan political support that underpins our work. The Hon. Martin Hamilton-Smith MP should be commended for his 45 years of public service: an army officer for 24 years and a member of parliament for 21 years. During his last term, Hamilton-Smith secured funding for many important projects in the seat of Waite, including the \$200,000 pedestrian bridge for Brownhill Creek Recreation Park, which is due to be lifted into place from the 9th to 10th of May, 2018. Martin retired from politics ahead of the March election and we wish him well for the future along with his wonderful electorate office staff.

Congratulations to Sam Duluk MP as the newly elected Liberal Member for Waite and The Hon. David Speirs MP, Minister for Environment and Water. Both Duluk and Speirs have spent a considerable amount of time in Brownhill Creek Recreation Park, discussing local community projects and plans for the future (once in a raging storm!). I am pleased to report that they strongly support the Connecting Communities-Wirraparinga Loop Trail Project and appreciate our combined efforts to protect and enhance local environment and heritage. We thank Duluk for securing \$100,000 over the next 5 years for heavy contractor works. This funding will be used for the mechanical removal of large pest plants and weed spraying, which will allow The Friends of Brownhill Creek, local schools and other volunteers to cope with bushcare maintenance, native re-vegetation and habitat restoration along sections of the Wirraparinga Loop Trail. We will work keenly with Duluk and Speirs over the coming years.

Nicolle Flint MP, Federal Member for Boothby, continues to be an enthusiastic supporter and was present at the Green Army Graduation (see next page) and the Mitcham Historical Society end-of-year event at the Edinburgh Hotel. Flint helped BCA to receive a \$20,000 grant from the Federal Department of Infrastructure and Regional Development, which has been spent on stone creek crossings, a footbridge, a stone vehicle crossing and heavy contractor works to provide safe access for the Green Army, park staff and future users of the Wirraparinga Loop Trail. 12

## **Green Army Project Completed At Brownhill Creek**



"During the 2016 election I secured a \$200,000 commitment for the Wirraparinga Trail Loop at Brownhill Creek. This was delivered through the Green Army and I commend the young team who upgraded two kilometres of the trail, removed seven hectares of woody weeds, assisted in rehabilitating the Grey Box grassy woodlands, preserved habitat for the Southern Brown Bandicoot and improved water quality of Brownhill Creek.

I commend Mitcham 2016 Citizen of the Year, Ron Bellchambers, and the many community organisations who took part in the project with generous contributions of time and money including the Rotary Club of Brownhill Creek, Friends of Brownhill Creek, Brownhill Creek Association, Mitcham Historical Society, Mitcham Council and the Brownhill Creek Residents Association.

I encourage everyone to have a go walking the trail where you can immerse yourself in our natural environment.

### Nicolle Flint MP Federal Member for Boothby"

On 12 December 2017, Mitcham Council elected members voted unanimously in favour of a staff recommendation to support the Wirraparinga Loop Trail project, authorising the Mayor and CEO to sign the trail agreement/MOU along with Carrick Hill Trust, SP Estates, the Department of Environment and Water and BCA. The official signing will happen soon. It is encouraging to have the backing of Mayor Glenn Spear, CEO Matthew Pears, Boorman Ward Councillors Andrew Tilley and Adriana Christopoulos and the other elected members and staff of the City of Mitcham.



The Kaurna Nation Cultural Heritage Association (KNCHA) is one of our most important and valued partner organisations and in a historic federal court judgement on 21 March 2018, Justice Mortimer determined that the Kaurna are the traditional owners of the Adelaide Plains. Kaurna Elder Lynette Crocker (see photo) was one of 11 claimants who have worked for 18 years on this claim. Justice Mortimer said the Kaurna applicants had shown "responsibility and great dignity" and their claim "has been a long time in the making". Attorney-General Vicki Chapman said the "determination is an important step towards reconciliation and the next six months would mark the conclusion of an ILUA (Indigenous Land Use positive impact on the documentation, recognition and promotion of Kaurna heritage in our area and along the Wirraparinga Loop Trail.

# Recaptured: Twilight Walk

## Report by John Wood

Twenty members enjoyed Glen Woodward's tour of Colonel Light Gardens on March 19th, after looking through the House Museum of another member, Helen Scarborough. Helen's museum is an amazing and memorable collection of objects of our past. Each room is packed to the ceiling with historical items, from rooms like the parlour, dining room, kitchen and bathroom. There is a shed full of toy tricycles, a laundry, an outside "dunny", tools, "depression ware" and a children's play room.

At 6pm we began the walk at the WW1 Military Camp Memorial near Mortlock Park, which was a gift from the Mortlock family estate. In 1915 the SA Government purchased "Grange Farm" and with the appointment in 1917 of Charles Reade as Town Planner (the 1st in Australia), "Mitcham Garden Suburb", later Colonel Light Gardens, was created. Reade designed curved streets with English names, wide roads, verges with trees and laneways for sewage, water, gas, and electricity. Plans for bungalows (14 different designs) with front and back yards and a side driveway made the suburb environmentally friendly and attractive. His neighbourhood shopping centres were the 1st in Australia. Reade planned a school, churches, Institute, parks and recreation area (now Reade Park).

The government purchased three farms west of Goodwood Road for the "Thousand Homes" development to make land cheaper. The streets there have names associated with Colonel Light. Colonel Light Gardens was transferred to Mitcham Council in 1975 and in the year 2000 it was listed as State Heritage.






# **Historical Research Article**

# Torrens, Sir Robert Richard, K. C. M. G., M. P. Research by Richard Irving

Diving deep into the National Archives, Richard Irving has sourced the following short historical article about the man who built Torrens Park aka the grounds of Scotch College... Sir Richard Robert Torrens.

Torrens "...originated relative to the land laws of South Australia, now known as the "Torrens Act" [he] is a native of Cork, Ireland, where he was born in 1814. He received his education at Trinity College, Dublin, where he obtained the M. A. degree. He was appointed Collector of Customs at Port Adelaide, South Australia, in 1841, in the exercise of which capacity he became familiar with the

laws relating to shipping; and drafted his famous Bill, which is of so complete a character that it has been adopted by more than one government. He was elected to Parliament; had a seat in the Legislative Council; was M. P. for Adelaide and held office as Treasurer and Registrar-General. The Torrens Act, on which his fame rests, passed into law in January 1858; and shortly after this he resigned his seat in order the more effectually to carry out the measure. He quitted the colony in 1863, and returned to England, where he received the honour of knighthood, and was elected M. P. for Cambridge, of which he is still the representative".

The Torrens Act, as described by Douglas Whalan from the Australian Dictionary of Biography, is "land titles no longer passed by the execution of deeds but by the registration of dealings on a public register; once registered the title of a purchaser became indefeasible unless he was guilty of fraud; and innocent dealers with interests in registered land were guaranteed either their interest in the land or monetary compensation therefor".

# Recaptured: David Roche Tour

Our November visit was to The David Roche Foundation which was established in 1999 by the late Mr David J Roche Am (1930-2013) which consists of an exceptional collection of antiques, paintings and objects d'art accumulated over his lifetime and preserved for the future.

A devoted collector of antiques and fine art, David was acknowledged both in Australia and abroad as a renowned collector. He often referred to himself as an 'enthusiastic buff'. As such, he was made very welcome by antique merchants from emporiums around the world. His entire life was spent acquiring mostly what he thought essential and all items were acquired with a place in mind. From toys, money boxes and naïve items to the finest of porcelains, paintings and furnishing items - he loved them all. It is fair to say that David rarely let a day go by without adding another 'essential' piece to his collection. It was his heartfelt wish to open his collection to the people of Australia with a hope that visitors would leave having found a favourite piece to remember.

The David Roche Foundation staff welcomed us with morning tea and a personal presentation and tour of the magnificent house and museum. With over 3,000 items in the collection we are so fortunate to have close access to such a world standard quality venue in North Adelaide.

# Recaptured: Southern Vale Bus Tour

On a lovely sunny day, we headed towards McLaren Vale where we met our host at the McLaren Vale and Fleurieu Visitor Centre. Rob Wood (John Wood's younger brother) was the ideal host having been a journalist in the region with an intimate knowledge of the various personalities in the local wine and tourist industry. Over morning tea Rob introduced us to Joe Petrucci of Sabella Wines who portrayed a history of the Italian families in the region.

After a hearty morning tea, we meandered through the McLaren Vale wine district to Kay Bros Amery vineyards who have in recent times celebrated their 125th anniversary of family involvement in the region. We were fortunate to have as our guide Colin Kay who is a direct descendent of the winery founders. The winery and original family homestead sit in a prime position at the top of a hill with magnificent views of the Mt Lofty ranges. The vineyard extends over 22 hectares and is the oldest in the region. Colin hosted an interesting tour of the winery and provided many historic anecdotes, particularly describing their traditional basket press method of wine-making. At the end of the tour was the fun part of tasting and purchasing wine, at much appreciated special prices.

Next stop, just out of Willunga was the delightful Penny's Hill wines in a farmyard setting including a chicken yard and other historic buildings adjacent the cellar door. We were fortunate to be entertained by host and owner Tony Parkinson. Tony is passionate about his achievements with Penny's Hill and described his procurement and development of the winery and precinct. As is the custom in the area we again concluded with a wine tasting and a purchase.

The township of Willunga has an abundance of hotels, this time we chose the Alma which provided a good quality lunch and refreshments.

Our final stop of the day was the famous Hardy's Tintara Winery complex enveloped in a wonderful garden setting A leisurely self-guided tour of the extensive complex was followed by a wine tasting. An interesting aspect of the Hardy's complex is a fine display of local art. This capped off a very pleasant day and gave us yet another glimpse of this beautiful wine area.
